

This rear view of the Organ shows the Music going through the Key frame. The music is cardboard sheets called books which fan-fold after they go over the key frame. The 100 music books that were with the organ, some older than the organ itself, have been combined into four programs. Three of the programs are mostly Dutch tunes. One program is of American tunes. Some new tunes have been added. The New Music is made in Belgium.

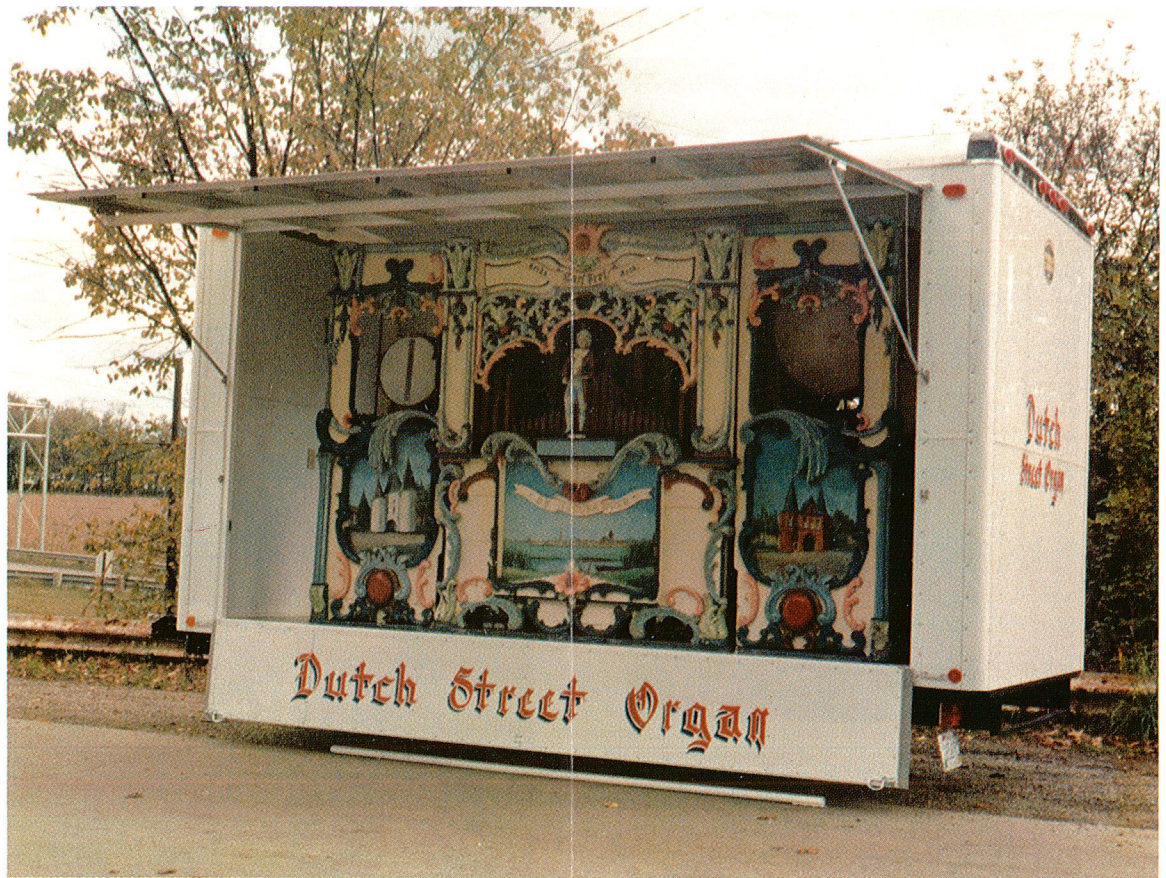

"De Troubadoor", a Dutch street organ is one of the most picturesque in this part of the country. It was built around the turn of the century in Breda, Netherlands, by Carl Frei. It has 178 wooden pipes and plays by low air pressure from its own bellows. It differs from American organs as it uses no vacuum. It has a bass drum, snare drum, Indian blocks and cymbal. It has four registers and an automatic tremelo.

Originally, when the organ was in Amsterdam, it was on a three wheeled cart and was played by hand cranking the huge flywheel. Although cranking is still possible, it is quite difficult because the motor and belts must also be turned. The front facade is original. The original top of the facade cannot be used in the new trailer because of the height. The pictures are Dutch art work. The original bandmaster was missing so Mr. B. Smiesing of Made, Holland, carved the one now visible. The organ is almost eleven feet long, seven feet high, and weighs over 1800 pounds. The 178 pipes consist of eight bass, eight trombones, eight cellos, fourteen bourdons, fifty-five stopped flutes, and eighty-five violin pipes.
