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

The ornate front of a 27" Regina disc changing music box one of several offered for sale on the following pages.


this catalogue are guaranteed to remain in effect until September 30th only (unless, of course, the item is sold

first). After that date we reserve the right to adjust the prices of certain instruments upward.






MUSICAL QUIZ


The results of our photography are shown below. See how many of the parts you can identify correctly. Answers are given at the end.





 - D. Link theatre organ/piano combination.




- 2. To the left of the tightly-coiled spring is a short lever protruding forward like a tongue. This lever, a part of a large upright 24½" Polyphon, is used to:















About Automatic Musical Instruments...

QUESTION AND ANSWER FORUM

We invite our readers to submit questions concerning any phase of automatic musical instruments — history, technical questions, etc. We shall do our best to answer them. The questions of the most general interest will appear in this column.

QUESTION: From time to time you offer cylinder music boxes with "organ" sections. Are the organ tones produced by reeds or are they produced by pipes? Were many of these made?

Beginning in the 1870's organ sections were added to certain Swiss music boxes, particularly those of the large ornate interchangeable cylinder variety. Usually the organ consisted of a bank of tuned reeds numbering about 20. These were played by a special comb usually located between two regular music combs. Instead of short pins such as those used for the steel music combs the organ section of the cylinder had staple-like bridged pins to permit the organ tones to be sustained.

The organ notes were sounded when the "staples" caused pallets to lift via a connecting system of small rods and levers. Wind to sound

the reeds was provided by a bellows driven by the music box mainspring.

Organ sections were a popular addition to orchestra boxes (boxes with drums and bells). A rare type of music box was and still is the full organ box - a box with just a set of organ reeds and no music combs or other instruments.

Although most organ boxes used a bank of reeds to generate the organ tones some very rare boxes were equipped with pipes, usually flutes. These produced a sharp clear tone in contrast with the reedy or humming tone of the reed boxes.

QUESTION: I hear that harp or zither attachments on Regina music boxes are extremely rare and that only a few exist with these. Is this so?

Zither attachments (also called "harp" or "mandolin" attachments - these give a plucking muted tone to the music comb.) were a fairly common addition to later Regina boxes - particularly the short bedplate styles of the 15½" and 20¾" disc diameters. While Regina music boxes without zithers are more plentiful now that those with them, the presence of a zither attachment commands no significant premium (at least we have not charged more in the past for boxes with these). Except for an occasional demonstration to show what the zither attachment sounds like most collectors leave the zither lever in the off position. The zither tends to mute the otherwise brilliant and resonant tones of the music comb.

QUESTION: I am the owner of a New American Musical Box. From pictures I have determined that it is the same instrument as a Gem Roller Organ. Are both really the same?

Yes, both are identical. The Autophone Co. of Ithaca, New York made three basic roller organ models: (1) The Gem Roller Organ, a 20-key roller organ - the smallest instrument in the line. (2) The Concert Roller Organ - an instrument with the same note range of the Gem but housed in a larger case with a hinged glass front panel. (3) The Grand Roller Organ - a larger instrument with a 32-key or 32 note range. These are quite rare today.

All three of these organs were widely marketed by music houses, department stores, mail order firms and others. Some of these companies put their own stencils on the roller organs, and your "New American Musical Box" is an example of this. Many of these were also sold as the "Chautauqua Roller Organ." The entire subject of roller organ and paper roll organ names is an extensive one.

QUESTION: I think that the Mills Violano Virtuoso is the most wonderful automatic instrument ever invented, and I hope to order one from you soon. Are these capable of playing serious violin music or just that of the "schmaltzy" variety? A friend (who happens to live near you in Los Angeles) told me that an instrument owned by Ted Bowers is the sweetest Violano he has ever heard. Can you recommend anywhere near me (in New York) where I can hear a Violano play? Also, one more question: Were any "solo" rolls made for the Violano or do all rolls have piano and violin?

The first part of your first sentence indicates that you should have worked for the Mills Novelty Company advertising department!

A wide variety of Violano rolls were made encompassing just about everything from great classics to fox trots. The latter tunes are the type most often found today, simply because that's what the patrons of public places demanded in the 1920's — the heyday of the Violano Virtuoso. On a well regulated instrument serious music can indeed be played in a beautiful and soulful manner. Ted Bowers (who, by the way, is no kin to us. He produced the "Whatever Happened to 1910?" record that we offer for sale) has made a speciality of the Violano Virtuoso and has tuned and regulated his to the Nth degree with the result that it sounds marvelous.

As you are but a Sunday afternoon's drive away from it I suggest that you visit the Musical Museum operated by the Sanders family in Deansboro, New York. Art Sanders is an aficionado of the Violano and has, in fact, spearheaded the Violano Virtuoso Society — a group interested in the history and music of this instrument. As the museum is apt to be packed with visitors on a weekend perhaps you should telephone or write first for a suggestion as to what time would be best for a leisurely visit.

Solo rolls with violin music only (without piano or with just a small amount of piano music) were produced and were labeled "Violin Solo" rolls. These are fairly scarce today. We have heard that rolls with piano only were also produced, but we have never seen one. As the main attraction of the Violano Virtuoso is the mechanically played violin we can't see what the purpose of piano solo rolls would have been. Perhaps one of our readers can enlighten us on this point.

QUESTION: In an earlier listing of a Philipps Pianella orchestrion you mentioned that it had a "tremolo." What does the tremolo do and how does it work? Were these used on many other types of instruments?

The tremolo is an attachment which is connected to the wind supply of a pipe chest between the pressure reservoir and the chest. Its purpose is to give a wavering or vibrato effect to the sound of the pipes.

In orchestrions the tremolo is accomplished in several different ways, depending upon the manufacturer. As an example large Wurlitzer PianOrchestras (made by Philipps of Frankfurt, Germany) have a tremolo of the interrupting type. A gate or a barrier is inserted in the main wind trunk. By means of an external pneumatic that opens and closes quickly a wire rod connected to the gate causes it to open and close. This stops the air flow, lets the air rush through, stops it, lets it rush through, etc. at a rate of several pulsations per second.

Weber instruments use a tremolo of the beating type. Just before entering the main pipe chest the wind passes through a small reservoir. When a tremolo passage is desired in the music a felt-covered beater vibrates against the outside of the spring loaded reservoir. This produces the desired pulsation in the wind entering the pipe chest and, immediately thereafter, in the sound of the pipes. A Weber Maesto orchestrion at hand is unusual in that the tremolo can operate at three different speeds!

An artificial tremolo in orchestrion or organ music can be provided by closely spacing (but not connecting) the perforations in the music. This will only work in an instrument with a fast repeating action - as a sluggish action would produce either a continuous tone or no tone at all. Mortier organ music is often found with this type of tremolo - however, in this instance, it is supplementary as Mortier organs usually have regular tremolos in the wind trunk as well.

Among other types of instruments we might mention the tremolo usually found in antique parlor reed organs: a revolving paddle which disturbs the air above the reed chambers to produce a wavering effect. The motor-driven revolving speakers of modern Leslie Speakers (often sold as an accessory with electronic organs today) accomplishes the same vibrato effect in an interestingly different manner.

Most large orchestrions (Hupfeld, Weber, Philipps, Popper, etc.) and most large band and dance organs were equipped with tremolos. Smaller instruments did not have them due both to the added expense and to the fact that the tremolo is most effective when used on an instrument with several ranks of pipes.

QUESTION: As Regina music boxes with 81/2" and 11" discs sold for less than those with 151/2" discs, why weren't more of the smaller sizes sold and why are the smaller sizes rarer today?

The 15/2" disc size is by far the most often seen disc size today, a fact that you apparently already know. From the very beginning in the mid 1890's marketing emphasis was put on the $15\frac{1}{2}$ " disc size, probably because many early discs, parts and possibly even some of the music boxes themselves were imported from the Polyphon Musikwerke, the parent firm of Regina. 15½" was the most popular Polyphon size.

Even around 1900 when Regina was listing and selling many disc sizes (8½", 11", 12¼", 15½", 20¾" and 27") the two smallest sizes were not actively promoted. Possibly the 151/2" size at that time represented the ideal product for the public's pocketbook and the dealers' profit requirements. Prices of most 151/2" instruments ranged from about \$50 to \$100 (automatic changers were, of course, much higher). Perhaps selling a small Style 21 (an 8½" disc box which retailed for all of \$7 in 1896!) would have returned an insufficient profit for store overhead, a salesman's selling efforts, etc.

QUESTION: In measuring my game room for a photoplayer I find that I don't have enough room to set the instrument up in its original way: i.e. with the piano in the middle and a chest on each side. Would it be cricket to put the side chests close together and put the piano in front of them both? I can make the proper pneumatic connections easily enough just by using more tubing. However, I don't want to do anything to impair either the sound or the proper operation of the instrument.

Go ahead and install it as you mention. In fact, this was sometimes done in original installations in which the orchestra pit was not wide enough to accommodate the 12' to 20' width of a photoplayer. In 1916 Wurlitzer instructed its installers that the "One Man Orchestra" photoplayers of that firm could be set up in that manner.

As a general rule of thumb, a distance of about 10 to 14 feet is the maximum that a pneumatic impulse should travel through small diameter rubber tubing without causing either a noticeable delay or a sluggish response. In metal tubing (used in most large American "Fotoplayers," Wurlitzer photoplayers, very large orchestrions, etc.) the length can be longer as the wall of the tubing is rigid and does not dampen the impulses.

QUESTION: I notice on page 233 of your book, "Put Another Nickel In," that you have a Wurlitzer PianOrchestra set up in your living room. I am planning to set up a larger orchestrion also and wonder how the sound volume can be adjusted or regulated to suit the size of the room. Any suggestions you can give will be appreciated.

The PianOrchestra shown in the book was set up in my New York home. Since moving to California several years ago the instrument reposes in a corner of your editor's office! Plans, however, call for reinstalling it (or a large Hupfeld or something similar) in my new home

as soon as time permits.

That particular PianOrchestra had the upper inside panels lined with sheets of sound absorbing soft fibreboard when I acquired it. As I wanted to be able to hear it throughout the house I removed the fibreboard. If you plan to install your instrument in a small room some sound "padding" such as this is a good idea. Another idea is to lower the wind pressure on the pipes if the sound is too loud, or raise the pressure if the sound is too soft. This can only be done within the tuning limitations of the pipes, however. As an example, a large orchestrion voiced on 6" of pressure (as measured by a water column) can usually be tuned properly on pressure as low as 4" or so and on pressure as high as 8". Recently Mr. Larry Givens of Wexford, Pennsylvania, told us that he has successfully tuned his Seeburg H orchestrion on 9" of pressure (it was designed for 6").

Probably the best thing to do is to set your large orchestrion up in your living room first. Try it for a while as it is - and then adjust it later once you have heard it for a few days. The room itself will play an important part. For instance, a large instrument (or a small one, for that matter) will sound louder when placed against a hard wall and softer when placed in front of drapes or curtains. Drapes, rugs and upholstery do much to quiet a room.

We have found with large orchestrions that it is best to position them from 6" to 18" out from a wall in order to permit the piano (which is usually at the back of an instrument) to be heard properly. This also allows the piano to be tilted outward from the back for tuning

without moving the main chassis of the instrument.

With our PianOrchestra installation we found that the entire family played it a lot. To save frequent raiding of the orchestrion's coin box we made the instrument operable with a push button (a doorbell button) located on a wall. As your instrument is probably equipped for remote wallbox operation (most large orchestrions have solenoids on the coin trip mechanism for this purpose) you might consider this idea also.

QUESTION: How many different types of automatic musical instrument rolls exist? How many different types of music box discs?

These are interesting questions. We've never stopped to count them, but we would estimate somewhere in the 100 to 200 range for the rolls, and perhaps this is on the low side. An English gentleman informed us that he has tabulated 114 different types of music box discs - but this figure includes duplications (the same style of disc sold under different labels). A worthwhile project for someone would be the listing of different rolls and discs together with some data about them (the width of the roll, perforation spacing, instrumentation, instrument for which it was intended - for music rolls; for discs, the diameter, manufacturer and other pertinent information). If one of our readers would like to submit a tentative listing we'll publish it — and then it can be added to by others.

11975 E. FLORENCE AVE. SANTA FE SPRINGS, CALIF. 90670 QUESTION: In checking over your offerings of organs I notice that you refer to them, in many instances, as having so many "keys." What are keys? I would think that the ones with the most keys, which seem to be larger in your descriptions, would be the most expensive. Why is this not so? What is the difference between a band organ and a dance organ? Why do band organs seem to bring more money? Is there any book with organ information in it? I am just a beginner at this, so I hope you don't mind so many questions. I am very pleased with the nickelodeon just received from you, and I am considering buying an organ.

ANSWER: No, we don't mind questions at all. Sometimes in cataloguing instruments it is easy to overlook the basics while giving in-depth technical data!

For a good general guide to all sorts of organs we would recommend that you buy "From Music Boxes to Street Organs" - a book translated from the Dutch by Mr. Wade Jenkins. We can supply a copy for \$6.95, or you may find that a bookstore in your own area stocks it.

Generally speaking, organs can be grouped into two main classifications: Band organs (or, as they are known in Europe, "fair organs") and dance organs. Each type of organ is different from the other and each was designed to serve a different purpose.

Band organs are the type that we associate with circuses and merry go rounds. These are loudly voiced with wind pressures of 9 to 14 inches used to blow the pipes. These, as a rule, are smaller than dance organs - as fewer pipes were needed to produce a given volume of sound. Band organs were made in America by Wurlitzer (who had the largest share of the market by far), the North Tonawanda Musical Instrument Works, Niagara, and Artizan. Each of these firms produced models in standard format and issued illustrated catalogues. Today, the most often seen models are Wurlitzer styles 103, 105, 125, 146-A, 150, and 153. Many of the organs of the other three firms were converted, beginning in the 1920's, to Wurlitzer rolls as Artizan, North Tonawanda, and Niagara rolls became scarce.

In Europe the best known makers of band organs were: Bruder (who may also have made certain instruments for Wurlitzer in the pre-World War I years), Limonaire, Ruth, Frati, Gavioli, and Verbeek. There were, of course, other makers - but the above named ones accounted for most of the production.

Band organs were generally discontinued in the 1920's and 1930's (the last Wurlitzer band organ was shipped from the factory in 1939). Of the thousands of band organs originally made, probably 75% were made before 1920. Hence band organs, as a type, are fairly scarce today.

Dance organs were made for indoor use in dance halls, restaurants, ballrooms and similar places. They are voiced more softly (usually on 5 to 7 inches of pressure) and usually have many more pipes than do band organs. They are usually larger in format also. Dance organs were nearly all made in Belgium by Mortier (who went out of business in the 1950's), by Decap (who is still in business today - but who is making primarily electronic rather than pneumatic organs), and by Bursens. If you have been receiving our catalogues for a period of time you may recall that two years ago we purchased the fabulous inventory of choice condition organs personally made by Mr. Arthur Bursens. These were resold by us to all parts of the world and, as of this writing, only one specimen remains in stock from this group.

Dance hall organs are still used in certain restaurants in Belgium. In recent years we have shipped many from there to customers here in America and have purchased others (such as the Bursens warehouse hoard) and have shipped them to various distribution points in the I'S A

The term "keys" refers to the music system of the organs. Most European instruments use folding cardboard music books. These books have holes punched in them. As the books pass through the "key frame" the music goes over a row of spring loaded brass "fingers" or "keys" that are pressed down by the book. When a hole appears in the book a key pops upward through the book. By means of a lever arrangement the other end of the brass key opens an air hole and causes the appropriate note to sound - in the manner of a player piano (but using pressure usually, rather than vacuum).

The number of brass keys in a keyframe is the number of keys in the organ description. Hence a "35-key Limonaire" organ would have thirty five spring loaded keys in the key frame. A 101 key Mortier would have 101 metal keys, and so on. Generally speaking, modern dance organs (this side of 1930) have the largest number of keys. This is because many of these instruments have modern facades with multiple lighting circuits on them, or have a display of drums and traps and other sound effects gadgets that require control. Also, as a general rule, dance organs have more keys than do band organs due to the layout of the pipe registers. However, the number of keys doesn't necessarily reflect the musical potential of the instrument any more than the number of pages indicates the quality of a piece of literature. It is what is done with the keys that counts!

The term "keys" has, over the years, been adapted to other instruments - particularly those of European manufacture. So, you may see a pneumatic instrument with a vacuum tracker bar referred to as having "so many keys," even though it may have no brass keys at all! For instance, instead of saying that the Wurlitzer (Philipps) Paganini has 130 holes in the tracker bar you could say that it has "130 keys." Or you could say that the Hupfeld Pan Orchestrion has "124 keys." Or, we suppose that it would be correct to say that a regular home player piano is of "88 key" specification!

Concerning the pricing of an organ (or any other instrument), there are many different factors which enter into this. Among those are rarity, desirability (demand by collectors), the type of music played, the appearance of the instrument, the condition of the instrument, etc. When pricing an instrument we take all of these factors into consideration. If our pricing structure of a particular instrument puzzles you, then ask us more about it. There are no secrets, and we'll gladly explain. Within an instrument of a given specification condition is usually a paramount pricing factor. For instance, we recently SOLD a Gavioli organ for \$500.00 (it was in rather poor condition) and we recently BOUGHT another for over \$5,000.00. Both of these instruments were approximately identical key-wise, but one was in vastly superior condition.

Small band organs, as a rule, bring more money than do small dance organs - mainly because the band organs are from an earlier era and are harder to find in choice condition. Really choice and ornate examples of both types are desirable, valuable and hard to find in the larger scale pieces. Incidentally, we recommend that all organ enthusiasts consider joining the Fair Organ Preservation Society - whose address is: c/o Mr. Kenneth Redfern; 3 Bentley Rd.; Denton, Manchester; England. Write for membership information (about \$3 per year).

AUTOMATIC MUSICAL INSTRUMENT DEFINITIONS

General descriptions of the types of automatic musical instruments we offer for sale in this catalogue. These descriptions may be of interest to you if you're reading one of our catalogues for the first time.

Cylinder Music Boxes. This type of box has the tunes programmed on a metal cylinder via one pin in the cylinder for each playing note. A cylinder may have thousands of pins in all. As it revolves the pins lift the teeth in the steel musical comb, thus causing the notes to sound.

Most cylinders contain several tunes. At the end of a tune the cylinder shifts to the side ever so slightly, thus permitting another group of pins with a different tune to come into play.

Boxes of this type are usually wound by either a lever or a crank. Power is transmitted from the mainspring to the cylinder by gears. Most cylinder boxes were made in Switzerland during the last half of the 19th century.

Disc Music Boxes. First marketed in quantity in the 1890's the disc boxes feature interchangeable flat discs on the underside of which are usually projections. These projections pluck the musical comb by means of an intervening star wheel. One advantage of the disc boxes is that the discs are interchangeable in the manner of phonograph records. A large collection of discs can be formed for low cost.

Leading German and American makers of disc boxes made such brands as Polyphon, Symphonion, Regina, Kalliope, Adler, Fortuna, Criterion, New Century, Stella, etc.

Roller Organs; Paper Roll Organs. These small (usually they will fit on a table top) organs contain sets of tuned metal reeds. The vacuum or wind to operate the reeds is supplied via a hand cranked bellows. The music comes in a number of forms, including paper strips, paper rolls, cardboard and metal discs and pinned wooden rollers.

Player Pianos. Player pianos were popular during the early 20th century. Power for playing the piano is provided by a foot-pumped vacuum bellows. The musical program is contained on a perforated paper piano roll which actuates valves and pallets as it passes over holes in the tracker bar.

Nickelodeon Pianos; Orchestrions, Player pianos used in restaurants and other public places were electrically operated and were actuated by dropping a coin in a slot or wallbox. These coin pianos are popularly called "nickelodeons" by collectors today.

The basic nickelodeon piano consists of a piano with a mandolin or "rinky tink" bar added. Sometimes a xylophone or a rank of pipes is provided in addition. Nickelodeons with extensive instrumentation including drums and traps are called orchestrions as they are, in effect, a mechanical orchestra.

Some of the larger orchestrions are capable of providing marvelous musical effects. Leading makes of nickelodeons and orchestrions include Wurlitzer, Hupfeld (the world's largest), Philipps, Popper, Seeburg, Welte, Cremona, Coinola, Western Electric, Nelson-Wiggen, Weber, etc.

Generally, most orchestrions use different types of rolls — so a representative collection of orchestrions can provide a really varied selection of music!

Dance Organs; Band Organs. These are self-contained pipe organs. The interiors contain from a few to many ranks of pipes, often with drums added for rhythm effects. Those which are loudly voiced for outdoor use are known as band organs or fair organs. Ones for inside use in dance pavilions are known as dance organs.

Music for these organs comes in three main forms: (1) Pinned cylinders — used on pre-20th century instruments for the most part; (2) Paper rolls — used mainly on small and medium size organs made in the U.S.A.; (3) Folding cardboard "books" — used on most types of very large organs.

Leading makers of band and dance organs included Mortier, Limonaire, Wurlitzer, North Tonawanda, Decap, Bursens, Niagara, Artizan, Bruder, Marenghi and Verbeek. Other Instruments. From time to time you'll find many other types of interesting automatic instruments offered in our catalogues—including the Mills Violano-Virtuoso and Hupfeld Phonoliszt-Violina violin players, player reed organs such as the Aeolian Orchestrelle, mechanical singing birds, musical clocks, the Encore automatic banjo, the Wurlitzer Automatic Harp, reproducing pianos (such as Ampico, Duo-Art and Welte— which had elaborate expression controls to re-enact the actual performance, including nuances and tonal shadings, of the original artists), theatre photoplayers for silent movie background music and sound effects, etc. In addition we feature from time to time old cylinder and disc phonographs, old radios, etc.



Known as the "Regina Corona No. 36 - Flat" this instrument was manufactured shortly after 1900. The original catalogue description reads thusly:



The musical portion of the Style 240 consists of a short bedplate double comb 15½" disc mechanism. It is operated by a lever which has three positions: Stop (at any time), Start, and Stop (at end of tune).

The phonograph portion consists of a 78rpm mechanism which plays records via a Grafonola (Columbia) reproducer. The records are played on a felt-covered turntable which is removed and stored in the base of the cabinet when not in use (when the music box mode is being used).

The instrument offered here has the phonograph arm and parts of the inside wooden horn missing. The phonograph collector or repairman will have no great

difficulty in adapting another Grafonola mechanism to it, or using a compatible mechanism of a different make. The turntable, drive mechanism, spindle and other phonograph parts are presently with the instrument and are installed in their proper positions.










To be a bit more specific than the above description we give the specifications of the Concerto's instruments: There are eighty three piano hammers. Some of the strings are tuned to the same notes, so the musical scale is somewhat less than 83. (This tuning of more than one string to the same note was to permit rapid trills or repetition. When the same note is to be sounded twice in rapid succession it is hit by two different hammers on two different sets of strings. One

hammer could not strike and then fall back to its rest position in time to sound the note again quickly) There are ten tubular metal orchestra bells mounted in the upper left of the case. The drum and trap department consists of a small "bass" drum, a cymbal and a snare drum with six beaters. The cymbal has two beaters: one to strike at the same time as the bass drum and the other for independent striking.

The specimen we offer is in playing condition and has a





This mandolin box (so-called from the mandolinlike tone of the box - an effect obtained by tuning several teeth

to the same pitch so that they can be played rapidly in succession - giving a mandolinlike ringing tone. This is not to be confused with the "mandolin," "harp" or "zither" attachment found on many boxes. This attachment, consisting of a tube of crisp paper applied to the music comb, just imparts a different sound to the music; the repetition rate of the notes and the musical arrangement are unchanged) was made in the late 19th century by Mermod Freres of St. Croix, Switzerland.

It is a rather large one and uses a 16" long cylinder. Overall dimensions are: 32" wide, 12" deep and 18" high (lid open). The top is inlaid with a pipes of Pan motif. The front of the box has a multicolored wood inlay featuring Orpheus the well known Mermod trademark (although Orpheus usually takes the form of a metal escutcheon; the inlaid trademark is unusual).














Above: Overall view of the box — with the drawer open to show the extra cylinders.

PRAXINOSCOPE MUSICAL MOVING PICTURES

Introduced as a parlor entertainment device in the 1870's the Praxinoscope became very popular. The instrument seems simple enough now, but in its day it was a real innovation that attracted interest and wonderment. (We might mention that its interest-attracting appeal is still present as it is fascinating to watch!) By means of twelve mirror facets mounted on a center carousel a matching series of twelve pictures is reflected and is seen by the viewer. As the carousel turns one scene after another comes into view with a rapidity that gives the scene a lively animation.

The Praxinoscope was exhibited at the 1878 Paris fair and, again, in 1889 at the Universal Exposition held in the same city. Each time it won prize medals.

Due to economic considerations most Praxinoscopes were simply mechanical and not musical. These regular Praxinoscopes are highly sought after and are quite scarce.

The ultimate Praxinoscope is the type offered here. It combines a Praxinoscope instrument with a musical bell box (by B.H.A. of St. Croix, Switzerland). As the Praxinoscope turns a musical accompaniment is given by the music comb and bells. A system of pulleys permits the Praxinoscope to be driven from the music box mainspring.

The specimen we offer here is in excellent condition throughout. The musical mechanism is a bit sluggish and could use cleaning and regulation. The case and the Praxinoscope portion will require no attention.



SWISS CHALET WITH MUSIC BOX by Bremond of Geneva...

This Swiss musical chalet is unusual in that it contains an exceptionally large and fine musical movement. Made by the celebrated firm of B.A. Bremond (Geneva, Switzerland) the box uses an 11" wide cylinder and plays eight tunes. CARVED BEARS MUSICAL STAND

This hand carved knick-knack stand was made in Europe (probably the Black Forest) a few decades ago. It is an ornately and minutely carved and was designed to be put on the floor next to an armchair. It is 3'1" high overall.



ATTRACTIVE ITHACA AUTOPHONE Paper strip organ


The Autophone, made by H.B. Horton of Ithaca, N.Y. circa 1880, is one of the most quaint and most interesting of the paper strip organs. It is also, incidentally, one of the nicest made, one of the scarcest and one of the most sought-after!

It uses a 5½" wide paper strip which passes over a tracker bar of 22 keys or playing reeds. The forward movement of the paper strip is accomplished by opening and closing the bellows with the palm of your hand. By means of interlocking parts this movement actuates a clockwork escapement which pulls the roll through the tracker assembly.

The Autophone is small. On its beveled base it measures overall: 10" high, 10" wide, and 5" deep. The Autophone is of mahogany; its base of oak.

H.B. Horton was a versatile man who achieved fame and financial success in many fields. Clock collectors today know of Horton as the maker of the famed Ithaca Calendar Clocks, among the most famous of all American time keeping devices. In the musical field Horton made a wide array of instruments - including the popular mass produced Gem, Concert and Grand Roller Organs. When your editor lived in Vestal, N.Y., less than an hour's drive from Ithaca, he was a perennial frequenter of the many antique shops in the area. Over the years a number of Ithaca Calendar Clocks were encountered, as were some of the roller organs, but never an Autonhone


AN ATTRACTIVE CONCERT ROLLER ORGAN

We offer an attractive example of the well known Concert Roller Organ - a type of instrument made from about 1880 to after 1900 in Ithaca, N.Y. The music is provided by twenty tuned metal reeds which are actuated by the pins on a wooden roller or "cob." The cob revolves several times for the playing of a single tune, edging over each turn via a screw feed. This permits the musical arrangements to be more extended than they would be if the arrangements were limited to what could be pinned on one revolution.

A sticker on the underside of the expression glass cover reveals that this particular piece was sold years ago by the G.H.W. Bates Co. of 74 Pearl St., Boston. 
Musical mechanism of the Concert Roller Organ.



It is a flute-playing organ clock made in Neukirch (in the Black Forest) about 1850. The maker was A. Mukle, and his original signed tune card is still with the clock.




Views of the Mukle fluteplaying clock. Case-wise and interior-wise this is the most outstanding such item we have ever handled.



ANIMATED FLUTE PLAYING HALL CLOCK

This attractive clock dates from the mid 19th century and was probably made in the Black Forest. The upper part of the clock displays a colorful oil painting of a Swiss lake and mountains at the lower center of which is the clock face.

Above the scene is an animated stage containing five mechanical figures, each delicately made in the form of a musician with french horn, piccolo, etc. As the music plays, the figures move.


The musical movement consists of a rank of flute pipes operated from a pinned barrel. Many different tunes are programmed on it.

The instrument is unrestored, but is in fine restorable condition. The musical movement is simple and will be easy to rebuild. There are two small wooden panels at each end of the barrel missing from the case. In addition, the top back panel and the lid, both of which were simple panels, are gone. 



NELSON WIGGEN ORCHESTRION STYLE 8 With piano, mandolin, xylophone and bells!

This instrument should titillate the fancy of every collector of orchestrions! It is a rere breed of cat: a Nelson-Wiggen Style 8 orchestrion which was originally factory equipped to use a style "G" (or "4X") orchestrion roll!

By way of explanation we mention that most Style 8's were factory equipped to use regular "A" rolls. The "A" roll is equipped to play three instruments: piano, mandolin and one other. On the regular "A" roll Style 8's the bells and xylophone were alternately played by doubling up on an alternating switching mechanism.



The instrument presently offered uses a regular orchestrion roll which has a sufficient number of perforations to operate the orchestra bells and xylophone independently. The melodious metal orchestra bells and the resonant wooden xylophone bars are both by J.C. Deagan of Chicago. The range is 22 notes from G to E.



This nickelodeon piano was sold under the "Empress Electric" name by Lyon and Healy of Chicago. It was made during the World War I era. The piano plate bears the "Leland" trademark - one of several used by Lyon & Healy.

An identical instrument is pictured as the "Bell Piano" at the left side of page 51 of "Put Another Nickel In."

Instrumentation consists of a piano, mandolin and a two-octave (24 notes) set of orchestra bells. These mechanisms are Coinola and 'were made by the Operators Piano Co. of the same city. The piano uses a regular ten-tune type "A" roll; one of which goes with it. Additional rolls are available at low cost.

This instrument has been partially rebuilt. A complete pneumatic rebuilding is recommended. In addition, a non-original coin slot has been put on the front, and the opening for the original one is vacant on the side. Apertures have been cut in the bottom board and also in the lid to

permit a view of the interior. If you are a stickler for originality, you will want to re-do these boards (simple pieces of wood with quartered oak veneer on them). You may want to leave them as they are, however, as the insides are interesting to watch. We have an open bottom panel on an Empress instrument here in our showroom.

The case is of light limed quartered oak. The front is highlighted by three pretty multicolored art glass panels which are illuminated from within as the instrument plays. Dimensions are: 5'2" wide, 2'8" deep and 4'8" high.

Coinola orchestra bells are pure toned and melodious. When restored this nickelodeon will be a lot of fun to listen to.




COINOLA MIDGET ORCHESTRION With violin and flute pipes

Casewise, this is one of the most attractive Coinola Midget Orchestrions we have had the pleasure of handling. The interior needs a lot of work, but being a Coinola "O" roll orchestrion, it is certainly worth the effort.

The instrument contains a piano plus a rank of violin pipes and a rank of flute pipes (the same complement as the pipe section of the Coinola SO, and mounted on an identical chest). The various extra instruments are automatically controlled from the music roll, or via on/off switches at the left side of the orchestrion.

The instrument uses the well known type "O" Coinola orchestrion roll which plays the pipes via a special solo section cut into the right side of the roll. The solo scale encompasses two octaves (24 playing notes).





The flute pipes are of wood; the violins, of metal.

The instrument was restored several years ago. During the restoration a number of non original parts were added. Also added was a supplementary vacuum pump. Although the instrument will now play after a fashion, the next owner will want to re-restore it. A small crack in the left side of the piano plate will require welding. This means that the piano will have to be (or at least should be) restrung... a good idea anyway. We offer the instrument as completely unrestored, and price it accordingly.


Recuts of "O" rolls are now available from the Player Piano Co. of 620 E. Douglas St., Wichita, Kansas. Each roll is of ten tunes. A wide variety is available. To start your library, the first three rolls are compliments of us.

The case of this Midget Orchestrion is of attractively patterned quartered oak. The front is set off with red cloth in the grill panels. At the center top is a beautiful panel of opalescent art glass with a musical motif medallion in the middle.

Case measurements are 4' wide, 2'2" deep and 5'3" high.

Classic orchestrions of all types are a vanishing species. The "O" roll instruments are particular favorites of collectors. It is our guess that any Coinola "O" roll orchestrion will be a \$4000.00 item within three years.

CHOICE PIERRE EICH SUPER VIOLIN PIANO In excellent condition with many rolls

Designated as the Super Violin model this nickelodeon piano features an excellent keyboard piano, a mandolin attachment an a rank of 30 well made and excellently toned violin pipes. The violin solo part of the piano scale is arranged so that the piano may be silent during the playing of violin solo passage, or the violin pipes can play one series of notes while the piano plays an entirely different series as accompaniment.

This instrument was made circa 1930 by the firm of Pierre Eich. This company was well known for its quality instruments, many of which had elaborate expression capabilities.


The Super Violin measures 6'8" high, 2'8" deep and 5'3" wide. It will take up no more floor space in your home than will an ordinary upright piano. As is the case with any keyboard nickelodeon, it can be played by hand in the regular manner if desired.

The exterior of the Super Violin is decorated with beveled mirrors and illuminated escutcheons and with two green art glass panels (in the roll doors). The instrument is unrestored but is very clean and will be a pleasure to work on. We would estimate that a complete restoration would not be necessary to get it playing again, as many of the pneumatics are still supple.


Two dozen multi-tune popular rolls go with the instrument. We have a large stock of additional rolls available cheaply.

Expression in the music is provided by a double swell shutter in the top of the instrument. We have never heard a Super Violin, but judging from the way it is made and the way that the music rolls are laid out, we imagine that it will be a very choice piece from a musical standpoint.

OUTSTANDING REGINA MANDOLIN ORCHESTRA A late electric (original) model...

Although the Regina Music Box Co. of Rahway, N.J. marketed several different types of coin-operated pianos (including some made by Peerless of St. Johnsville, N.Y. and others made by Marquette of Chicago), the only one that achieved a large volume of sales was the Regina Sublima.

The term "Sublima" was a favorite of Regina for it was used to describe several different types of disc music boxes as well. However, it is best remembered today for the Regina Sublima Piano - a coin-operated mechanical piano which uses a heavy manila paper roll. First introduced after the turn of the 20th century these instruments were known simply as Sublima Pianos. Later the name was expanded to the glorious-sounding "Regina Sublima Piano and Mandolin Orchestra." Still later the name was contracted to "Mandolin Orchestra" - the name appearing on the specimen offered here.

Known officially as a Style 304, this was one of the few types of Regina Sublimas that were originally issued with electric illumination and an electric motor. (Most other types were spring wound) This style was first introduced in 1906. The last one was shipped from the factory in early 1920. The instrument offered here bears the serial number 3041821 (which, translated, means No. 1821 of Style 304) and was shipped from the factory to its first owner in Wisconsin on August 29, 1919.

The Mandolin Orchestra is of medium size (5'6" high, 41" wide, 22" deep), although its graceful lines make it look more petite than this. The one we offer is in a golden quartered oak case that will require no refinishing or attention.


The Mandolin Orchestra plays one tune (from a five tune roll) upon receipt of a coin. The sound can be that of a straight piano, or, by means of a lever on the right side, a tremolating mandolin-like tone may be turned on. The sound is pleasant, a bit nostalgic, and is reminiscent slightly of a Wurlitzer Mandolin Quartette - although the Regina instrument is more subdued.

With this Mandolin Orchestra are three rolls. The instrument is crisp, clean, and immaculate throughout. It plays well and is ready to perform the moment that you get it. A nicer Regina Mandolin Orchestra could not be found.

NATIONAL NICKELODEON PIANO W/ROLL CHANGER

For rhythmic toe-tapping nickelodeon piano music the National is hard to beat. The arrangements are snappy, fast and have that "Roaring Twenties" sound. For this reason Nationals have always been good money earners in museums and, as would be expected, they are collectors' favorites.

From a mechanical viewpoint the National is quite intriguing. Some of its unusual features are: (1)An automatic roll changing device that holds eight different rolls. When a roll has played through it disengages immediately from the near-the-tracker-bar position and moves away so that another roll can be brought into place. The rerolling is then done while another roll is playing - an unusual feature. (2)A tune selecting device. This is accomplished by having eight



different coin slots - one slot for each of the eight rolls! Put a nickel in the appropriate slot and you get the tune you want to hear! (3) A tune indicator. A numbered wheel, one number of which is visible at a time through a small window. indicates which tune is currently in the playing position.

The instrument offered here is in an attractive light golden oak case. Although it has not been rebuilt, some work has been done on it and it presently plays well. It sounds very nice and will be enjoyed by all who hear it. We offer it, however, as an unrestored instrument. With it are enough rolls to completely fill the automatic changer and some extra rolls as well.






CABINET-STYLE LINK/MARCOLA NICKELODEON In beautiful art glass case...

This Link/Marcola nickelodeon is interesting and impressive. It is housed in a large ornate cabinet and is about the size of a Coinola SO orchestrion. It measures 6'10" high, 5'2" wide and 2'9" high. The front is ornamented with two large art glass panels and ornate scrollwork. Affixed to the front are two hanging art glass lamps (not shown in our pictures: one needs repair - and both will be shipped in a box with the instrument).





The instrumentation consists of a piano with expression controls, a mandolin attachment and a rank of flute pipes. The machine was made by the Automatic Orchestra Company of Detroit, Michigan. The insides are that of a large Link cabinet-style piano with mandolin and flutes. The entire Link chassis was purchased intact by the Automatic Orchestra Co. and inserted in the large art glass cabinet. It was then sold under the trade name of "Marcola." (The Automatic Orchestra Co. of Detroit was either the same as or

was affiliated with the Marquette Music Co. of the same cityhence the Marcola name. This has no connection with Chicago's similarly-named Marquette Piano Co.).

The piano plate of the instrument reads AUTOMATIC ORCHESTRA COMPANY / DETROIT MICH. The last part of this signature is a cast metal plate which has been affixed over the regular piano plate. Removing the plate we read: AUTOMATIC MUSICAL CO. / BINGHAMTON / NEW YORK. The serial number of the instrument is 6011.

This colorful nickelodeon uses the regular Link "RX" roll, three of which go with it. Extra recuts of these 15-tune rolls may be obtained from Mr. Edward Freyer of Box 373, Flemington, N.J.

The instrument is in choice unrestored condition. It will need rebuilding of the pneumatic portion and will need refinishing of the case — although the pneumatic part was done several years ago, so parts may still be serviceable. Some small repairs are needed to the art glass. In person the tall art glass fronted instrument is very pretty and is quite impressive. When rebuild the nickelodeon will be a real showpiece. As it is, to our knowledge, the only one of its kind it will attract much attention from advanced collectors. By the way, it has four(!) separate coin slots, so you won't have to do much looking to find where to drop a nickel.






The Wurlitzer Automatic Harp is one of the classic American automatic musical instruments. Along with such pieces as the Violano Virtuoso and the Encore Banjo the Wurlitzer Harp is at once interesting appearing and unusual.

The Style A Harp was manufactured by the J.W. Whitlock Company of Rising Sun, Indiana. According to information we now have (we have the Whitlock factory records) some 1,500 Automatic Harps in all were made, beginning in 1905. Two hundred and thirty eight different Harp music rolls were produced.

The Style A Harp we offer here is in an attractive light golden quartered oak case. It measures 6'5" high, 3'4" wide and 2'3" deep.

The Harp has been worked on and "improved" by strengthening the framework and pin block with steel tie rods and bars. For exhibition purposes (this Style A Harp was part of a leading musical exhibit) the rewind-type roll mechanism was converted to an endless type (but using the original roll drive and tracker bar assembly). To rebuild this instrument to its original condition, as the purist will want to do, will require a lot of work - and is a task not to be taken lightly! It can, however, be done - and with an instrument of the Style A Harp's rarity and importance, it is well worth it. Although the pictures do not show it, the interior is "rough." We don't mean to overemphasize the pejoratives, but we do want to give a realistic description of the work needed. Of course, if the desire is just to "make it play," without concern for 100% originality, then very little work will be necessary.







The bass drum as seen through the left side panel.




The beautiful mirrored roll case doors.

MILLS Violano-Virtuoso



THE MILLS VIOLANO-VIRTUOSO Violin playing machine...

The Mills Violano-Virtuoso had its inception with a violin-only model made around 1904. This instrument, named the "Automatic Virtuosa," achieved modest success in the marketplace. A 1908 tour of England which featured a Virtuosa playing in stage performances accompanied by a human pianist convinced Mills that an automatic piano should be incorporated with the violin.

This was done. The result was the famous Violano-Virtuoso. Appearing first at the 1909 Alaska Yukon Pacific Exposition in Seattle the Violano-Virtuoso stole the show at the U.S. Patent Office Exhibit. From that time until about 1930 Mills produced about 5,000 of these instruments.

Today the Violano is a favorite with collectors. Virtually every representative collection includes at least one specimen of this intriguing device. Fortunately, Violanos are among the most plentiful (if a population of a few hundred can be called plentiful) of the old time coin operated music machines remaining with us.

The Violano-Virtuoso is completely electrically operated via small electric motors and electromagnets. A series of wire brushes "read" the holes in the Violano paper roll as it passes over the contact roller.

The instrumentation of a single-violin model consists of a real violin which is played automatically. The bowing is accomplished by four rosined celluloid discs which revolve at varying speeds as called for by special perforations in the roll. The speed varies with the type of passage being played. The fingering of the strings is done by a series of tiny electromagnetically operated mechanical fingers which lift and stop the strings at the appropriate intervals.


Properly regulated, the Violano is very musical and expressive. The human interest factor of a Violano is very high. The Violano-Virtuoso is and will continue to be a favorite of collectors everywhere.



It is presently a bright red color as its former owner intended to exhibit it in a restaurant.

As an attraction the two-violin model of the Violano Virtuoso is highly desired by collectors everywhere.

Harvey Roehl, in his "Player Piano Treasury" book, gives a thumbnail sketch of this instrument:

"Throughout the years, various different models of the Violano appeared, the best known of which is the two-violin DeLuxe model, commonly referred to as the 'Double Mills.' This machine uses the same music rolls as the single models, so no new notes are played over that the one-violin jubs will do. However, since it is virtually impossible to keep two violin strings in exact pitch with each other, the result is not only one of increased volume, but a sort of apparent harmony as well."





It is our pleasure to offer one of the most elegant orchestrions ever made during the "golden era" of orchestrion building. It was made by Popper & Co., one of the world's most prominent makers of these instruments, about 1915.

Designated as the "Salon Orchestra" it was intended to provide pleasing background music for fine homes, parlors and salons. It operates automatically from a multi-tune roll. A supply of rolls goes with the instrument we offer, and others are available.




View of the front panel showing part of the colorful scene. The torches will appear to flicker and flame as the music plays!

Instrumentation of this Salon Orchestra is extensive and consists of: piano, mandolin, bass drum (with epression), snare drum (with expression), tympani, crash cymbal, a large xylophone, a large set of orchestra bells, a triangle and two rows of pipes giving the effects of violin, viola and cello! The pipes are provided with a tremolo to give a wavering or vibrato effect during certain passages.

In order to provide pleasing music in imitation of an orchestra, much attention was paid to the expression devices. As noted, the drums have expression and can be played either loudly or softly. The piano is provided with expression controls. In the top of the orchestrion are louvered swell shutters which open and close for loudness and softness. From a technical point of view, it is interesting to note that the shutters of this particular instrument operate in an analog fashion: rather than the "yes - no" (open or close) of regular shutters these can be opened fully, slightly or in any intermediate position.

The Salon Orchestra is beautifully constructed. At present it is unrestored and will need pneumatic rebuilding (or at least partial rebuilding). The components, however, are exceptionally well preserved and are as choice as they could



Interior view of the Salon Orchestra.





possibly be. Quality components - the orchestra bells, xylophone, etc. are all of exceptionally high grade - went into the Salon Orchestra. If you appreciate fine workmanship, you'll love this orchestrion.

Visually, the Salon Orchestra is magnificent! It is 6' wide, 3'3" deep and 9'6" high. It will need a space about 10' high in order to provide speaking room for the swell shutters. The front is ornamented by a colorful circular glass panel with two flaming torches as part of the scene. Behind the panel is a "motion picture effect" lighting device which impart a flaming and flickering to the torches as the instrument plays.










The case is of light golden oak and apart from some minor surface work will require no attention. Few surviving Wurlitzer orchestrions are as nice appearing as this one! The art glass, as noted earlier, is stunningly beautiful. A color photo of the instrument is yours free for the asking. The art glass needs a few minor repairs, but these are hardly noticeable (we can have this done for you at low cost).








View of the interior of the Seeburg L.










tially visible. Right: Overall view of the Helios orchestrion.

The case is of light golden oak and will require refinishing. A clear glass panel in the front gives a view of the orchestra bells as they play. The orchestrion uses the standard Helios rolls, a supply of which goes with it.

If you've been wanting a Hupfeld Helios orchestrion here is a wonderful chance to get one that will fit into a small space (most of the "brothers" of this instrument are 8' to 10' or more high!). 

CREMONA THEATRE ORCHESTRA Solo Style M3

In the course of selling automatic instruments we've handled many fine collections and individual pieces. In this way we have had pass through our hands many, many unique and one-of-a-kind items - pieces which, if assembled in a gallery all at once, would make an unbelievable collection.

As you have probably done we've also spent many hours wistfully poring through the illustrations of mechanical musical instruments that were in existence a half century ago but which are rare or, worse, non-existent today.

We've always admired Cremona products for their workmanship and beauty. In his "Player Piano Treasury" book Harvey Roehl called Cremona instruments the "Rolls-Royces" of the field. The ultimate Cremona instruments were the Cremona Theatre Orchestras, Style M3 and Style O. Until the acquisition of the Solo Style M3 offered here, we had never SEEN an example of either!

Here for your consideration is a Cremona Solo Style M3 Theatre Orchestra:

The instrument is, in essence, a huge orchestrion which is in three connected parts: a center or console part and two side chests.


The Theatre Orchestra can be operated in two modes: by hand and foot if you are a musician, or, for the full effects, by paper rolls. The Style M3 uses two different types of rolls.

On the left side tracker bar can be placed regular 88-note piano rolls of the type you can buy today under the Aeolian, MelOdee, QRS, etc. labels. These rolls provide the melody. 




Angular view of the Cremona Theatre Orchestra. It is a large and impressive instrument!




The 88-note rolls go on the left tracker, the 134-key orchestrion rolls on the right side.




Foot pedals are used to operate the drums, etc. - or most can be operated automatically from the 134-note orchestrion roll.







ARTIZAN / WURLITZER BAND ORGAN Ideal for a Merry-Go-Round!

Built at the Artizan Factories in North Tonawanda as an Artizan Style C-1 Military Band Organ this instrument was converted, probably by Wurlitzer in the late 1920's, to play standard Wurlitzer Style 150 Military Band Organ rolls.

It is an impressively large organ for an instrument of this type. It measures 7'6" high, 7'9" wide and 3' deep. The front of the instrument is heavily carved. In the center is the original scene of a castle overlooking a lake with a seascape below it. The top gallery is hinged and folds down to permit moving through short doorways. The drums remove easily for moving.





The Artizan band organ is crammed with pipework. Directly above this caption is a view of the underside of the organ—showing some of the pipes under the chassis.

Here are the original factory specifications: Instrumentation consists of: Basses, open, octave and contra: wood trombone, wood trumpets, violin, open and stopped pipes in accompaniment and melody, a 20" diameter bass drum, a 14" snare drum and a cymbal. In all there are 136 various pipes and effects.

In addition to the pipes mounted in the main chassis there are a large number mounted horizontally on the underside of the main section.

DECAP ORCHESTRION/ORGAN IN CLASSIC CASE --With richly carved and ornamented front--

This lovely orchestrion was manufactured by Decap Brothers of Antwerp, Belgium. We estimate that it was made in the 1920's.

With its classic almost-Victorian front the instrument closely resembles a large piano orchestrion of the era. IT is, however, an organ (without piano). The instrumentation consists of many ranks of pipes (the interior is literally crammed with them) ranging from small scale flutes and piccolos to large bass pipes measuring about five feet in length. An interesting rank is formed by the metallophone pipes — small flutes with metal diaphraghm resonators.

Adding to the musical output of the pipes are the trap effects of a large bass drum, a snare drum, a cymbal and a triangle.

The instrument was designed to use Decap orchestrion rolls: but we would recommend converting it to use Arburo (Jazz Orchestra) rolls. The tracker bar spacing, roll width, etc. are the same. All you will need to do is to rearrange some of the tubing. We shall give you a Jazz Orchestra layout sheet to provide information about this. This conversion is recommended as there is a wide variety of music available on the Arburo rolls, and new music is being cut. A library of Arburo rolls will go with the instrument (unless Decap rolls are requested) — including new tunes.


The Decap orchestrion is unrestored but in immaculate condition. It will be a pleasure to work on. Refinishing of the case will not be necessary. Wiping with a damp cloth will restore the interior pipes to their original brightness.



IMPRESSIVE 77-KEY BURSENS ORGAN With many "exotic" effects!

From the standpoint of interesting and exotic ranks it would be hard to beat this large 77-key Bursens dance organ.


Special Effects: Exposed and in full view on the front as it plays is a real pneumatically operated accordion. Below the accordion is a saxophone. Here's how the saxophone works in a dance organ: Each note on the saxophone is represented by a special wooden saxophone reed pipe mounted in a rank directly behind the saxophone. As a given note plays the tone comes from one of the saxophone pipes. At the same time, the appropriate valve lifts on the display saxophone, giving the appearance and same sound as if the saxophone were being played by a human player!

Drums and trapwork: A large bass drum; a snare drum with two rhythm beaters and a special wire brush beater; a tambourine; a Chinese wood block with two beaters; a cymbal; a set of three tuned temple blocks!

Expression: Automatic shutters open and close as directed by special perforations in the music. This gives expression that is both charming and realistic.



The "orchestrions" as designated by Mortier consisted of (usually) self-contained organs with many ranks of pipes, drums, etc. all housed compactly in a chassis - often with pipes crammed underneath and on the underside of the "roof" in order to fit them all in! Most of these were made in

the 67-key and 84-key specification. The fronts were of the "traditional" orchestrion format and often resembled contemporary products of Hupfeld, Popper, et al. However, the Mortier orchestrions contained no piano but made up for it by many, many pipes! The second classification was the dance hall organ. These (usually) had a main chassis, four side chambers for pipes, and a large decorative facade which disassembled into many parts for easy moving. These facades had the traditionally ornate "organ" format with curved outlines to the panels, open grillwork in front of the pipes, etc. These were made in sizes from about 70 to 101 keys. (The largest Mortier ever made measured 52 feet wide and was of the 101 key specification)


The later instruments of recent years are an entirely different breed of cat from the early traditional styles, have different pipework and specifications, and have, in some instances, larger numbers of keys.











Here is the story of the Welte Legacy of Piano Treasures as written by Ben M. Hall (excerpted from the back of the album jackets):

"MAGIC PERFORMANCES COME BACK TO LIFE! The most remarkable of all reproducing instruments was a device invented by the German genius, Edwin Welte, around 1900. Welte invented the first reproducing system for pianos, a system which was as different from the then-current player piano mechanisms as stereo recordings are from Edison cylinders. Edwin Welte gave reproduced piano music a soul.

The Welte recording and reproducing system was a marvel of sheet mechanics. In its way it seems far more remarkable than the electronic wonders of today, and somehow it seems to stand as a sort of monument to mechanical genius at the peak of its cog wheeled, cammed and levered, pneumatic glory. It made its debut in 1904... Briefly, here is how the Welte worked:

The recording unit, connected to the Steinway in the music salon, contained a roll of specially aged, thin paper, marked off into 100 parallel lines. Poised over each line was a little wheel of extremely soft rubber, with pointed edges. Each wheel was in contact with an ink supply, and in this much of the process it resembled a small printing press. Under the keyboard of the Steinway was a trough filled with mercury; attached to the underside of each key was a slim rod of carbon. As the key was depressed, the rod dipped into the mercury and an electrical contact was established between it and an electromagnet connected wo the corresponding inked roller in the recording machine. The harder the pianist hit the key of the piano, the deeper the carbon rod would plunge into the mercury, and the stronger the current between the rod and the electromagnet would be. The harder the inked rubber wheel was pressed against the moving paper roll, the wider the mark it printed on the paper. The pianist's pedaling and speed of attack was captured in the same way.

After a selection had been finished, the paper roll was removed from the recording machine and run through a chemical bath to "fix" the colloidal graphite ink which had been printed on it by the rollers. This ink was electrically conductive, and when the roll was ready to play back, it was put into a master reproducing Vorsetzer which "read" the markings in almost the same way that the magnetic markings on bank checks are read today. The term "Vorsetzer" meant "sitter in front of" in German.

Shortly after recording a selection, the artist returned to the music salon and found the Vorsetzer "seated" at the keyboard at which he had been playing. But nobody laughed when the Vorsetzer began to play. The results were astonishing... The Welte Vorsetzer recreated the pianist's own performance with every pause, every shade of expression, every thundering chord...

MUSIC ROLL PERFORATING via the LEABARJAN PERFORATOR...

Several months ago we acquired a 32-page illustrated booklet entitled "The Perforation of Music Rolls with the Leabarjan Perforator." Harvey Roehl, owner of the Vestal Press, learned of our find and expressed interest in reprinting it. Now, several months later, the reprint - the exact size, quality and format of the original - is ready. If you would like one the price is \$3.00. Ask for "Leabarjan Reprint" when ordering.

The book, incidentally, is hardly absorbing reading from a storytelling viewpoint. Rather, it is an explanation of music roll arranging for the amateur. If making or arranging your own music rolls has ever piqued your imagination, then you'll find this booklet to be full of helpful hints. Some of the illustrations from it are reproduced after the following paragraphs...

The Leabarjan Manufacturing Company's history has been obscure, and little about the firm has found its way into print. An exchange of correspondence between ourselves and Mr. David Junchen. Dave, incidentally, is a real genius himself when it comes to arranging music rolls. We treasure a newly-arranged style "O" orchestrion roll he gave us as a gift after staying with us a summer several years ago. It's too bad that Dave wasn't around 40 years ago to arrange orchestrion rolls in the heyday of the industry!

It is with Dave's permission that we reprint his letter to us - a letter that sheds light on the Leabarjan Company:

May 6, 1969

Dear Terry and Dave:

Let me tell you about the results of some investigation I did today. As you may know I am installing a large Wurlitzer pipe organ in Hamilton, Ohio. Mr. Roy Haning brought to my attention that the Leabarjan perforators were made in Hamilton, so I did some checking and finally ended up this evening having a very pleasant conversation with the last owner of the Leabarjan Company, Mr. Leo F. Bartels. The company was incorporated October 10, 1911 with a capital of \$100,000.00. John C. LEAse was the inventor of the perforator, and Carl BARtels joined the firm also, and Mr. JANzen was the financial backer. Carl Bartels was the company president, his son Leo secretary, and Franz Janzen vice president and treasurer.

In later years Carl and Franz abandoned their interest in the company and its operation was continued by Leo until he sold the company in 1928 to some men who wanted to use it for a machine shop. He credited the demise of the company to the rising popularity of the phonograph. The building, at 521 Hanover Street in Hamilton, has been razed and another structure now stands there. Mr. Bartels told me that none of the interested parties ever received one cent of dividends!

In recent years a number of inquiries addressed to the Leabarjan Company in Hamilton have been forwarded to Mr. Leo Bartels by some of his friends at the post office, even though the company as such died in 1928. Most of these inquiriers have been from people wanting to locate perforators. Mr. Bartels says that he has no idea where any may still be found. Mr. Bartels is a very nice gentleman and offered to send me an old Leabarjan catalogue.

He estimates the total production of perforators at under 1,000. The most popular model, the No. 5, sold for about \$75.00. A number of production perforators (which made up to 16 copies from a master roll) were sold. I asked him if around ten of these large duplicating perforators were made, and he replied that a good many more than ten were manufactured. Most were electrically driven, but they did have a hand cranked model!

One of the company's founders, Franz Janzen, saw the perforator as a valuable educational device, and to a certain extent it was, but of course this was a very limited market. Mr. Bartels told me that the greatest market for the perforator, and particularly for the production perforators (which sold for around \$500.00) was to composers who wanted to plug their own songs when the major roll companies wouldn't! He also said that a considerable foreign market existed, particularly in South America. He said that no really large scale production perforators were made, such as for a company like QRS. He mentioned that famed roll arranger J. Lawrence Cook got his start perforating on a Leabarjan!

Thus concluded my conversation with Mr. Bartels...




